10	THE COURT: Mr. Banks, do you wish to make a
17	statement to me on your own behalf before I impose
18	sentence?
19	THE DEFENDANT: Absolutely, Your Honor. I want to
20	start by saying something. This is somewhat of a tragic
21	situation. And I just don't know what to really what
22	to believe, because a jury came back with a verdict of
23	guilty. I have heard all of this stuff read. I have
24	heard almost a vitriolic type of attitude from Mr. Kirsch.
25	You hear all of this, and you just I am

- 1 listening to everything that is being said about what I
- 2 did and what we did. And then I hear the remorse
- 3 argument. I cannot stress enough, and I don't think
- 4 anybody in this courtroom, if they had a child, if they
- 5 had anything, they knew their child didn't go out to
- 6 commit a crime, they would tell them to admit that you
- 7 committed a crime.
- 8 Irrespective of what the whole world would say, I
- 9 know what was in my heart. I know what was in my heart,
- 10 and there was no scheme anywhere.
- When I was younger, my friends used to want to go
- 12 out and do a lot of dirt. I had a common saying, "I'm not
- going to jail for anybody." I always brought myself with
- my own car, and I would leave in case somebody wants to go
- 15 start committing a crime. David Banks does not commit
- 16 crimes. David Banks does not go into anything thinking
- 17 about a crime.
- I wrote a few things down here I would like to just
- 19 read. I won't be with you too long, Your Honor, but I
- think it is important for me to say a few things.
- It is absolutely inconceivable that me, my
- 22 brothers -- my five other defendants, with no criminal
- history, woke up one day and will say, this is a great way
- 24 to continue to get money. See, I know that didn't happen.
- They know that didn't happen. And we know in our heart,

- 1 God knows that did not happen. It just simply did not
- 2 happen.
- Now, in 1999 or 2000, that time frame, I worked for
- 4 a company called LSI Logic, a semiconductor company. My
- 5 salary was somewhere around 110,000. That was back then,
- 6 plus, like, a 10 percent bonus.
- 7 It is inconceivable that, okay, oh, by the way,
- 8 guys, let's get together, let's continue to engage in some
- 9 criminal conspiracy. Oh, by the way, you are going to
- 10 take a chance on going to jail. And I'm going to sit back
- and take that risk and then say I am going to get
- 12 compensated. I would have much rather just worked a
- 13 normal job.
- This was not about a scheme. This was about a 100
- 15 percent internal and strong belief in what we had
- developed. Everybody around here is saying, well, it is
- 17 -- no, we have law enforcement professionals. They would
- not be forthcoming. That was unfortunately what we were
- 19 told about this software.
- We originally set up meetings. We met in
- 21 Washington, D.C. with Ben Nighthorse Campbell to tell him
- 22 about our software. He is the one that referred us to the
- 23 FBI. That is how the agents came about. We went through
- 24 all these sorts of evolutions. Next we say, okay, let's
- 25 hire on some FBI agents, consult them and bring them in as

- 1 part of the scheme? Who does that? Who does that?
- I worked closely with these gentlemen. And people
- 3 say I don't have respect for the law. I have respect for
- 4 the law. I have friends -- he pulled me over because I am
- 5 a black guy. No, he pulled you over because I was
- 6 speeding. I have respect for the law.
- 7 While Mr. Kirsch brings up my traffic record. I
- 8 take responsibility for my traffic record. And not
- 9 everything -- the last case got thrown out because I had a
- 10 valid driver's license. There are issues that Mr. Kirsch
- 11 doesn't even know about.
- So it is just, to me, it is more hatred being
- pushed my way to get me a longer sentence. That is all I
- 14 see it as. FBI agents in the building working with us.
- 15 I'm going over their processes and procedures. I worked
- 16 hours -- 8 hours a day working with FBI agents, Customs
- 17 agents, understanding their procedures, understanding
- their profiles, understanding 302.
- We went through all of this stuff at the request of
- 20 Steven Cooper from the Department of Homeland Security,
- 21 who made this recommendation that we bring on some guys,
- 22 because the original product we had was suited for state
- 23 and local government.
- Repeated trips; four or five trips to D.C. The
- last trip the FBI was there. I remember a lady named

- 1 Melissa McRae. There were other people there; Customs,
- 2 Border Patrol. We did not just believe. I don't know if
- 3 anybody understands what it is like to be an entrepreneur
- 4 or small business owner. We saw something. Nobody is
- 5 going to tell me what those people said to us. They got
- 6 us to do certain things; go do this and go do this.
- 7 They requested modification after modification. I
- 8 hear the term "42 staffing companies." You are sitting
- 9 there -- what happens in the corporate world when you make
- 10 a commitment, a good-faith commitment? And in many cases,
- 11 vice presidents in the corporate world actually have a
- 12 budget and say, I have \$2 million toward this project,
- 13 show us what you can do. We are a small company. We have
- 14 to show -- I don't have IBM's name. I don't have Northrop
- 15 Grumman's name. Lockheed Martin, they go in, they have
- 16 all of the political connections, they just go in and it
- is, yeah, you are Lockheed Martin. You are this.
- 18 We have to prove something. It wasn't proven by
- 19 fraud. Any modifications, every single time, they kept
- 20 coming back. And I'm talking, like, are these people ever
- 21 going to commit to anything? It's a catch 22; we are
- 22 already in. So do we finish? Do we finish making the
- 23 modifications for these people? Do we keep extending the
- 24 company?
- I look at it, okay, if we had to make 42 decisions

- on whether or not do we continue staffing, that's what
- 2 this was about. It was not about a criminal fraud in a
- 3 criminal scheme.
- 4 Obviously, you can take certain things that look a
- 5 certain way, an e-mail, and you can look at it any way you
- 6 want, but it is true this is not a scheme. We would not
- 7 waste all this time. And then I just think the inclusion
- 8 of law enforcement into a company that is engaging in a
- 9 criminal scheme is absolutely ludicrous. And for me to be
- 10 that stupid of a criminal, I just can't -- it is just hard
- 11 for me to accept.
- We provided a lot of this information to the
- 13 Government. There is clear statements. You made a ruling
- 14 in Gary and Ken's talking about initial statements. We
- 15 stand by our initial statements. We brought initial
- 16 statements before here. And two of my initial statements,
- 17 are Banks stated IRP was building software, Case
- 18 Investigative Life Cycle, and working on securing
- 19 contracts. Another one with Spherion, IRP is trying to
- 20 secure a large contract with the New York City Police
- 21 Department.
- 22 All of this stuff, as far as initial
- 23 communications, was true. I had no idea, okay -- you sign
- 24 a contract, we're obligated for that contract. I told
- 25 Mr. Shannon, I was like, when are you going to get this?

- 1 I said, we have debts to pay.
- This was not a scheme. That was in early 2004. In
- 3 late 2003, DHS was talking to us about a pilot project.
- 4 That pilot project required us to make some modifications.
- 5 In 2003, if we make the modifications, obligate ourselves,
- 6 we went back continuously to Homeland Security. Is this
- 7 going to be good? Yeah, yeah, yeah. This is great.
- 8 Okay, can we get a commitment? So this is not a scheme.
- 9 So that is just for what that is worth.
- 10 Even the paper, Your Honor, because that telegraph,
- 11 the article we complained about, that was released by the
- 12 government. And I quote, "The agencies were told that
- 13 temporary labor was needed to develop software that would
- 14 be sold." Whoever gave the government -- whoever in the
- 15 government who leaked that thing in the first place, words
- 16 betrayed them, and they actually told the press, "software
- 17 that would be sold" to the Federal Bureau of Prisons, DHS
- and other type of agencies "would be sold."
- That is what we told each and every staffing
- 20 companies. I challenge you, Judge Arguello, to look at
- 21 the things that were not there. And I'm just saying this
- 22 because I think it is important for me to say, we didn't
- 23 say it at trial, but it is important for me to say, when
- 24 we told the staffing company, we feel like we are close to
- 25 closing business, there was not one reply, not one, well,

- 1 you said you had a contract.
- 2 But then they come waltzing in here talking about
- 3 we don't have any e-mail that says they didn't have a
- 4 contract. They didn't testify they responded to us, you
- 5 told me you had a contract. They never had that. It
- 6 simply did not happen. We never communicated we had a
- 7 contract.
- I believed we were going to get one wholeheartedly.
- 9 John Shannon told us we are going to be able to sell this.
- 10 He said it is the best software he had ever seen. Is it
- 11 not that they can close business with NYPD? That was the
- 12 testimony at trial.
- I want to address a couple more things that I feel,
- 14 at least, happened to us. I looked up the term "rights."
- 15 It says "something that is due a person by law." "Due"
- 16 means "something that is owed or deserved." I also looked
- up one final thing, it is "privilege." I'm just an
- 18 African-American black man, trying to start a business.
- 19 And, honestly, you are going to hand down a prison
- 20 sentence. It is not the prison, it is the process that
- 21 severely disturbs me.
- "Due" as I said, is something that I am owed and
- deserved, whether that be a fair trial, whether that be a
- speedy trial, whether that be to present witnesses or
- 25 present a defense.

We went to hell and back to find a staffing company 1 2 representative -- and I will go ahead and say, a white 3 staffing company representative that will come in this court and tell that jury that this was not unusual. 4 was a man who worked with the FBI on a bait and switch 5 6 staffing scam. He understands the staffing industry. 7 \$300 million company. We didn't get into those type of 8 things, but he understands, and I feel cheated. 9 stripped. 10 And I just don't feel that we were given a chance. 11 Really, I didn't expect fairness. I saw that with my 12 sister. It is like we are not going to get a fair trial. And then I saw the remanding of Gary and Ken. I was like, 13 14 every attorney that talked to us says that just doesn't 15 So you start to feel like you are getting a raw happen. 16 deal. 17 I'm here today, after Gary and Ken got sentenced, with full knowledge I was coming in here to get sentenced 18 19 With some legal standard being tossed up and 20 argued about whether I would flee. Cowards flee. I don't flee. I believe in what we did. 21 fight. 22 believe we got in over our head? Some say you shouldn't 23 have went elephant hunting. They say maybe we should have These guys at this level 24 stuck to some smaller agencies.

are ruthless, and maybe we should have been going after a

- deer or something. But we believed in what we had.
- 2 So, with that being said, Judge, I don't think it's
- 3 a lack of remorse to maintain your innocence. If the
- 4 Government didn't agree with the verdict, what are they
- 5 going to do? They are going to maintain, no, we are going
- 6 to file something with the appellate court. We are going
- 7 to do whatever. That is not disrespect for the law. We
- 8 have an adversarial system.
- I know what is in my heart. I know what we did. I
- 10 know what I did. I know what I was thinking. Whether
- anybody else in this court, in that jury, knows what I was
- 12 thinking, I know what I was thinking. And I would never
- intentionally engage in any sort of criminal activity
- 14 whatsoever. Ever. I wouldn't do it.
- The funny thing is, staffing companies -- we
- 16 thought the government was setting it up -- contacted us
- between 2000 -- after the raid, 2006, some of the same
- 18 staffing companies calling back to see if we would engage.
- 19 We didn't get -- right now we are not developing a
- 20 product. So why would I engage with you at a staffing
- 21 company? I don't get into schemes.
- We had a purpose, and the purpose was to develop
- 23 software based on modifications that was coming to us.
- 24 There was no other reason to continue to maintain people.
- We already have people we have to pay if we don't satisfy

- 1 the government or these requests. They are not going to
- give us any business. We are not going to pay anybody.
- 3 That was some of the mindset.
- So, for what it is worth, Judge, I had one more
- 5 point, but it's slipping by me. And I guess I will
- 6 finally say, I don't know if you have owned a small
- 7 business or been an entrepreneur. I am -- certainly
- 8 Mr. Kirsch -- I did research your guys' history, I don't
- 9 see any business-related experience. And to understand
- 10 what a small business goes through, you talk about, well,
- 11 we'll figure out a way.
- We are African-American. We went to bank after
- bank; Guaranty Bank, National Bank in Denver. We went to
- 14 Pueblo Bank and Trust. At that time, Mr. Harper had good
- 15 credit. We went everywhere trying to get credit. We
- 16 talked to investors. Some investors were interested, some
- wanted to take too much of the company.
- The big companies, we went there, wouldn't sign
- 19 NDAs. They wanted to steal the software. Some said, "Is
- 20 that all you are going to show us?" We went through the
- 21 game.
- 22 So anybody who is going to sit here -- I know I am
- 23 not a criminal in my heart. And nobody is ever going to
- 24 convince me that I, David Banks, engaged in criminal
- 25 activity. I don't care what Mr. Kirsch says. I don't

- 1 care what the FBI says. I know what is in my heart. And
- 2 David Banks does not engage in criminal activity of any
- 3 sort. Thank you, Your Honor.
